February 2006

National Pubs Week is a joint event by CAMRA and pubs and breweries across the UK, to promote and celebrate all that is best about our pubs.

This year, Solihull and District CAMRA were invited to the Bluebell Cider House at Warings Green, where we welcomed both CAMRA and non-CAMRA members to a corner of fun and frivolity with three quizzes designed to raise money for charity.

The quizzes – 'What am I for': strange objects whose purpose was open to conjecture; 'Under the Microscope': well-known items seen in close-up; and 'Match the slogan to the Brewery', were enthusiastically entered, and the bonus round of funniest guess for the 'What am I for' objects raised a lot of laughs.

The quizzes raised a total of £23 for one of the pub's charities, the Solihull Association for the Blind, and in addition several people requested membership forms during the evening, so we look forward to seeing an increase in our membership shortly.

We hope that everyone who took part in the evening enjoyed themselves, and eagerly anticipate next year's event in February 2007.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Steve Dyson, the outgoing editor of this magazine, for all his dedicated hard work in producing the magazine over the last few years, and to wish him all the best for his "retirement" from its editorship.

## Pub & Brewery Watch

The Old Royal Oak Hockley Heath is no more, having recently shut its doors. The pub has been sold to a group of food suppliers who plan to transform it into a multi-million pound organic delicatessen, with the reopening scheduled for April this year. Following on from the Engine in Hampton in Arden, this would appear to be another example of where the site is of greater value to the owners than the returns from the pub.

Whilst Solihull and District CAMRA continues to lack a brewery in its area, another microbrewery has opened in Warwickshire. Purity Brewery, based in converted sheep sheds at Upper Spernall farm, Great Alne near Alcester, has been set up by two ex Bass employees, Paul Halsey and Jim Minkin. A number of us took a break from the Redditch Winter Ales Festival and visited the brewery, courtesy of Worcester CAMRA. Currently two beers are brewed, Pure Gold at 3.8% and Pure UBU (pronounced oo – boo) at 4.5%. The former, as it name suggests, has East Kent and Styrian Golding hops and the latter, named after the farm dog, Challenger and Cascade hops. For those interested in trivia the dog was named after the pop group Pere UBU and only subsequently was UBU said to be an acronym for Useless Bloody Urchin. The conversion of the farm buildings has been done to a high standard, with lots of shiny stainless steel and a strong emphasis on brew consistency. Following on from their very successful summer festivals at Bromsgrove Rugby Club, Redditch and Bromsgrove CAMRA held a festival in Redditch for the first time since 1982. The Redditch Winter Ales festival had 31 real ales as well as cider and perry. Given the numbers there on Saturday it was a great success. The Winged Spur in Ullenhall, voted Solihull and District CAMRA's most improved pub of 2004, is improving further. Licensees Clive and Mary are well advanced with plans to extend the pub. This will allow them to expand their range of real ales and ciders from the current four real ales (three guests) and two ciders.

The Red Lion at Claverdon has been closed for refurbishment. The pub was already very food orientated and it is hoped that any changes will not result in the loss of the separate public bar. The other pub in Claverdon, The Crown Inn, still continues as a traditional village local, with separate public bar and lounge. Two real ales are offered, Brew XI and a guest. The Crown Inn is one of the few free houses in the branch's area.



## Off Our Patch

#### **Expedition to The Bartons Arms Beer Festival**

A merry band of Solihull CAMRA dignitaries made a visit to the Bartons Arms Beer Festival on its opening Thursday to sample a few of the Real Ales, and additionally to try out the lunchtime special price £4.00 Thai curry. We also met the new Australian Landlord ,Mick, and his wife, who had been Oakham ales trained as most often there is only the amber nectar style stuff in his native land. He kindly offered to go into the cellars to draw off beers that had not yet found a tap in the bar but we felt the choice on the bar was so good that this service was not needed.

## The excellent beers we tried between us were

- Bartrams Dizzy Debbie 4.2% abv
- Beechams Crystal Wheat Beer 5.0% abv
- Bowland Sawly Tempted 3.7% abv
- Buntingford Pargetters Mild 3.7% abv
- Fox LJB 4.0% abv (too malty for my palate)
- Green Tye Coal Porter 4.5% abv
- Hart Siren 4.5% abv from the marvellous Preston brewery
- Hopstar Spinning Jenny 4.0% abv
- Leyden Nanny Flyer 3.8% abv
- Oakham Attila 7.5% abv (the drinker of the half looked very sleepy afterwards)
- Three Rivers Old Disreputable 5.2% abv
- Tring Tea Kettle Stout 4.7% abv
- Oakham JHB (oops that's always on but an excellent ale)
- Tring Walter's Winter Ale 4.0% abv

We left our host and a group of staff from the Wellington in Birmingham and should have gone straight back to Solihull in good health. However we visited the Bull on Price Street and were able to commend the bar maid on the jugs displayed! We tried the Osset pale ale but left the Adnams Broadsword.

We then wandered to the Shakespeare taking care of the steps in the doorway and had a reasonable Timothy Taylors Landlord. From this pleasant interlude we adjourned to the Wetherspoons for curry night and a little silent football on the TV before finally finding our Solihull bus again and enjoying the bus tour home.





## Knowle Survey Crawl

In January the Branch visited Knowle with the aims of meeting new local members and checking up on the local pubs. Unfortunately despite some excellent publicity in the local press, it ended up being the same group of active regulars who toured the Knowle hostelries. [Come on members, support your local branch and have fun to boot! Ed.]



We had intended to start at the Wilsons Arms, but their one remaining Real Ale (Fullers London Pride) had failed to settle properly, so we convened at the nearby Greswolde Hotel instead. There we had the choice of Tetley Bitter and Marstons Pedigree, though they are still served via unmarked hand-pumps. It makes you wonder if they sell as much Real Ale as they could, as most people wouldn't know it was available.

After a quick check of the Wilsons to ensure no one was still waiting for us, we moved on to the Red Lion. Here we were pleasantly surprised to find a choice of 6 ales: Charles Wells Bombardier, Greene King IPA, Brew XI, Hooky Bitter, Marstons Pedigree & Timothy Taylor Landlord. The (Taylor) Landlord was in particular good form, so good we stayed for a second. One of 4 Ember Inns in our area, this one is worth keeping a close eye on.

The tour ended in the Vaults. As usual 6 beers were on: Ansells Mild, Burton Ale, Greene King IPA, Tetley Bitter, Caledonian Deuchars IPA & Windsor Castle Sadlers IPA. The Windsor Castle didn't last long, it was replaced by Phoenix Thirsty Moon while we were there. As usual the Vaults is maintaining its own high standards.



## A Drink or Two in Hull...Continued...

The Friday was our "day out" on the coach. Three breweries and a town pub-crawl were on our agenda.

Having breakfasted well we all boarded the coach and were off to our first brewery, Old Mill in Snaith some twenty miles from Hull and a brewery well hidden in this small town. Nevertheless our intrepid driver found it and we were soon piling off the coach and into the brewery where Head Brewer Paul Simpson was there to greet us. Housed in a former 18th century corn mill and maltings the brewery was set up around about 1982 by a businessman who enjoyed his real

ales. A stoutish Mild, a session Bitter and Best Bitter Bullion are the staple residents supported by a cast of occasionals and monthly brews. Comments from the floor concerning the future of mild in the area were met with Paul saying that mild is declining but Old Mill will continue to brew it. I for one

was glad to hear this after the quality of this beer I enjoyed when I had tried it the previous night in the Hole in the Wall. Tongues hanging out we were introduced to the tasting room where the Bitter was the only brew on tap. Paul apologised to us for the lack of choice but we had come on a day not usually set up for brewery tours and the tasting room was not as fully stocked as usual. Nevertheless we managed to drink our fill before Ray our leader hounded us onto the bus for our next brewery, the brewpub The Goodmanham Arms in the folds of the Yorkshire Wolds.

Just outside Market Weighton, on the route of the Wolds Way, the Goodmanham Arms is a classic village local. Multi-roomed and packed full of

character, it is a pub off the beaten track boasting its own brewery. Peter Southcott has been at the pub since 2003 and can brew 1000 litres at a time and uses both Target and Fuggles hops. Beers we sampled were Choir Boys Dread a standard Bitter; Randy Monk a Best Bitter; Monks Revenge and Filthy Habit, both strong beers. Only one other person came in whilst we were there, a lone walker on the Wolds Way who likewise was impressed to find a pub with its own brewery.

Checking the watch Ray marshalled us back on to the coach for our final brewery of the day, Wold Top. So we left Peter in the calm, quiet atmosphere of the Goodmanham Arms.

Wold Top Brewery is not the easiest brewery to find. Hunmanby Grange, Wold Newton is not far from Driffield but it seems like it's in the back of beyond. The brewery is in an old farm granary building of gargantuan proportions. Indeed I've never seen a microbrewery in such massive premises... stacks of potential for growth! It has its own pub at Thwing, The Falling Stone. Set up in May 2003 by partners Derek Gray and Tom Mellor there is a selection of beers brewed including a Bitter; Falling Stone a Best Bitter and Wold Gold, a light coloured strong beer. We were disappointed however that only bottled beers were available in the tasting room. Apparently some 30% of the beer is bottled and interestingly enough, the brewery brewed a beer, Mars Magic for the fated Beagle project. The leader of the project Professor Colin Pillinger stays at Derek's B&B when in the area.


And so to finish the day the coach headed for Beverley, Ray distributing maps with all the pubs shown to enable us to undertake an orderly pub-crawl.

Beverley is a Minster town with a medieval central core with stacks of pubs. Our first port of call was the Sun, from the Tap and Spile 🔣 stable. A little characterless and sporting an unimaginative range of beers, it was not the best of starts to our evening. However, the Deucher's IPA was on top form and I do believe the pub holds a CAMRA Solihull branch record. The accompanying picture shows Ken Jackson with a half pint, surely a first!

Feeling a little peckish now, we decided to head for the Green Dragon in Saturday Market. The pub must obviously be on the site of an old burgage plot as it went back for miles and was quite narrow. Having a front bar and restaurant at the rear it served us well for a bite to eat. A good beer range but not in the best of condition. Broadstone Two Water Grog; Wold Top Mars Magic; and Ramsbottom Tomfoolery. We left here just as the Friday night circuit was starting.

On then to an institution... Nellie's or the White Horse to give it its correct name. Lit by gas lamps it is a superb time warp pub, multi roomed with a warren of connecting corridors. It has a ground level cellar where I spied at least eight 36 gallon barrels of Sam Smith's OBB on stillage. At £1.30 a pint they would not last long either as the pub was heaving!

From here we went to the Dog and Duck just round the corner in Ladygate, another pub which was disappointing beer quality wise. John Smiths Bitter; Greene King Abbott Ale; Deuchar's IPA; Hambleton Stallion and Cropton Endeavour which most of us left as it was definitely over the top. A pretty ordinary pub inside with a potentially good range of beers, which were not at their best plus the barmaid was smoking behind the bar and serving at the same time... not impressed.

The White Horse, aka Nellie's, Beverley Onward to the Durham Ox where the service was appalling. The young barman served all his friends first and popped back to me every once in a while to top my beer up. Wychwood Hobgoblin; John Smith's Bitter; Deuchar's IPA and Tetley Bitter, not very inspiring and depending on your viewpoint the Wychwood and Deuchar's were either cheap or expensive both at £2.20 a pint [3.8% and 5% respectively].

We soon vacated here to the Cornerhouse. The circuit was in full swing by now. The pub was full of

30+ somethings so we did not feel too out of it. A bank of hand-pumps met us. Rooster's Yankee; Greene King Abbott Ale; Tetley Bitter; Wadworth 6X; Black Sheep Bitter; Banks's Original; Timothy Taylor Landlord and Jennings Cumberland Ale. The pub is on a split-level, beer quality was OK and we were assured it is much more pleasant to visit this pub earlier in the day.

Our final pub was the Royal Standard Inn in North Bar Within. The GBG shows a guest, but all that was on offer was Tetley Bitter and Jennings Cumberland Ale, which was at least in good condition.

From here a tired bunch of CAMRA folk headed home after a long day with highs and lows. The highs, definitely Nellie's; the lows, no real ale at Wold Top Brewery but you


