1985 - A MILD YEAR, OR NOT?

Although not concerning the Solihull area directly, it is worth mentioning a staggering statistic I have just noticed. Of the 5.454 pubs in Great London, only EIGHT of them sold cask-conditioned dark mild this spring. It is also worth remembering that over the whole country mild is in a general decline and many milds are under threat of complete withdrawal. Let's try to make 1985 a mild year. If you don't drink it we could lose it for ever!



BREWERY VISIT, WHITBREAD FLOWERS

A couple of months ago several CAMRA members from Solihull and Redditch went round Flowers' Brewery in Cheltenham and we found it surprisingly interesting. To be frank, I find Whitbread's beers, pubs and attitude less than inspiring and I went on the Brewery trip rather begrudgingly. However, it turned out to be an excellent night out. The first thing that surprised me was the brewery building itself which was in the main very traditional indeed. We also had an excellent guide who was very affable and honest with us. He was very much in favour of real ale and spoke enthusiastically about how most beer brewed on the premises was traditional.

After showing us the brewery equipment our guide escorted us into the sampling room where we were looked after exceeding well! The free buffet was a pleasant surprise and so was the beer. The Flowers Original and Flowers IPA were much tastier than usual, NOT just because they were free but because there was absolutely no blanket or top pressure being used. Most Whitbread pubs use blanket pressure which can spoil the beer completely.

All of us enjoyed the trip and we would like to thank Whitbread for accommodating us.

A DREAM COME TRUE!

Three or four years ago, I used to spend many hours and much money on petrol travelling around the country in search of new or unusual beers because I was fed up with the same old beers available around Solihull, invariably brewed by the big six. That was before BERNIES REAL ALE OFF LICENCE opened in Cranmore Boulevard, on the outskirts of Shirley. It was like a breath of fresh air being introduced to a room with a stagnant choking atmosphere.

Now on our doorstep is one of the widest ranges of exciting real ales in the West Midlands. Although at any one time the traditional beers may only number seven or eight, the range is constantly changing so during a year dozens of beers are available. Bathams, Marstons, Banks's, Hook Norton, Hoskins, Burton Bridge, Robinsons, Everards and Wadworth are just some of the breweries that are represented fairly frequently. On top of all that some excellent and genuine Somerset Cider is always on sale at 43p per pint which is remarkable value when you see awful and insipid keg ciders in pubs selling at around 85p per pint! All the beers and ciders are available for takeaway in containers as small as one pint. At the other end of the scale 9 or 18 gallon casks are usually available.

In the editor's opinion, Bernie deserves her place in the Good Beer Guide more than almost all pubs in the region. Some CAMRA members think off licences should not be in the GBG because they believe we should be looking to promote pubs, and I would agree off licences probably do take away some trade from pubs. However, we are NOT The Campaign For Real Ale In Pubs. We should be looking to promote traditional beer as much as possible, which Bernie does. By selling unusual beers, eg. Donningtons SBA or Hoskins Old Original, people are far more likely to start drinking real beer and so increasing demand.

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If their local just sells Brew XI or something similar, they are more likely to drift into lager. Bernie also gives a very much needed change from M and B and Ansells, which dominate the whole of Birmingham.

Another very important point is the help she gives to new microbreweries who find outlets so hard to find. Several have folded recently in spite of Bernie selling their beers but at least she gave them a chance. Many of the pubs that go in the Good Beer Guide are owned by breweries that would never think of helping a small company. In fact they are probably glad to see them close because they don't like the competition.

Bernies Off Licence is slightly tucked away, but if you haven't found it yet, I'm sure you will find the journey well worth the effort. I always do!!

LAW BREAKING LANDLORDS

The practice of deliberately serving short measure pints to increase profits is well known and receives much publicity and attention. It is a tricky problem to solve. The introduction of over-size glasses could spell a decline in the use of handpumps and the cost of installing metered pumps would probably mean higher beer prices. On top of that there are instances where even with metered pumps and over-size glasses, landlords can still work a fiddle. One landlord with such equipment was once overheard boasting that he had bought a new car with illegal profits made from short measures.

Another problem drinkers face is the bad placing or non-existence of price lists at the bar. The Price Marking Order 1979 states that price list must be on display and clearly visible to customers. In many pubs in our area (and across the country) you need a pair of binoculars to read the small, insignificant price lists, tucked away behind the bar. This is a blatent infringement of the law and surely Trading Standards Officers know of it. Perhaps consumers should make more complaints to them.

Yet another undesirable act which probably is rare but something I noticed recently, is selling drinks that are out of date. I recently bought a bottle of Guinness that was months over the sell by date. The bar staff tried not to let the bottle go over the counter but I managed to get hold of it and the label had been mutilated where the sell by date was shown. The

Guinness was drinkable but not what it should have been. Presumably it would have deteriorated more, the longer it was left hanging about.

All this proves that there is still much wrong with the brewing industry and a healthy and active CAMRA, the only voice of the drinker, is needed as much as ever.



THE RAILWAY

The Railway at Dorridge now sells Draught Bass in addition to M and B Mild and Brew XI. Bar price is 77p and it seemed to be in reasonable condition on the occasion I tried it.

THE GREAT BRITISH BEER FESTIVAL

The opening of the GBBF is almost upon us and I for one am looking forward to it immensely. The 1983 festival at Bingley Hall was extremely enjoyable but I am still disappointed that last year's had to be cancelled, due to the fire at Bingley Hall. All this should make the drive well worth the effort, although I admit it is rather a long way.
