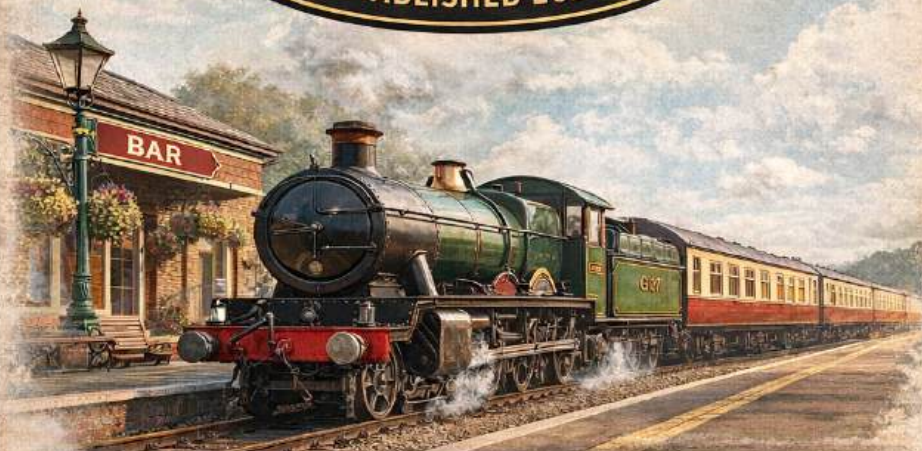

constantly changing beers; when we visited the ales were from Abbeydale, Pennine and Salopian, plus a full-on 6.5% dry cider from Heck's.

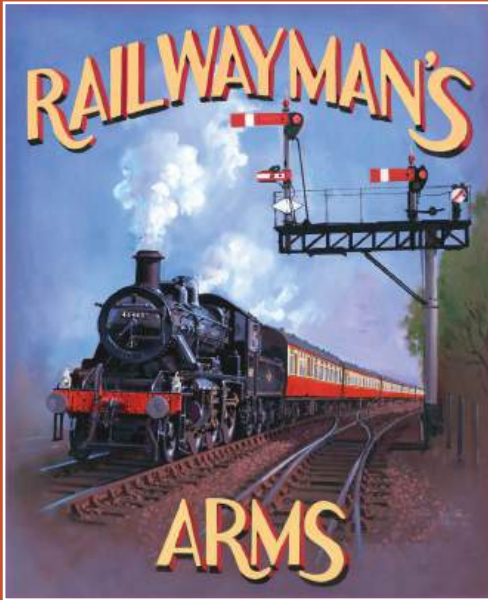

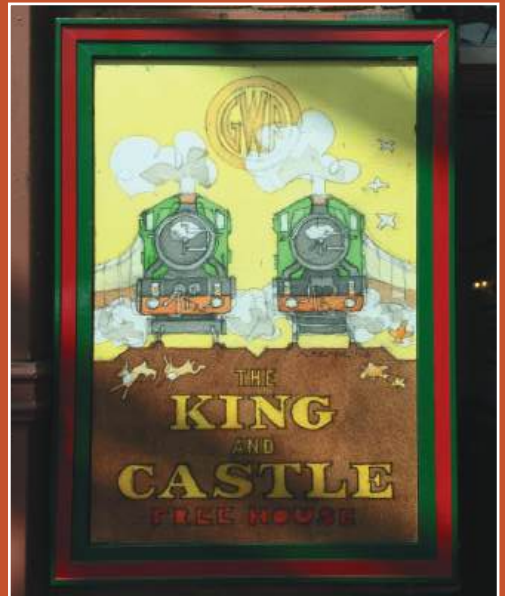

## Severn Valley Railway: History - and Pubs!

There are heritage railways — and then there is the Severn Valley Railway. Stretching for 16½ miles between Kidderminster and Bridgnorth, this lovingly preserved line is one of Britain's most immersive journeys into the age of steam. It's a place where locomotives breathe, volunteers bustle in period uniforms, and the countryside rolls past as if time has politely stepped aside.

But the SVR offers more than steam engines and scenery. It also boasts two of the most characterful railway pubs in the country: the King & Castle at Kidderminster and the Railwayman's Arms at Bridgnorth. Together, they bookend the line with warmth, ale, and a sense of camaraderie that feels as authentic as the locomotives themselves.

The Severn Valley Railway is a triumph of preservation, passion, and community spirit. Its stations — from the riverside charm of Arley to the vintage footbridge at Hampton Loade — look as though they've been lifted straight from a 1930s postcard. Steam and heritage diesel locomotives haul beautifully restored carriages through the valley, past woodlands, farmland, and the meandering River Severn.

At Highley, the Engine House Museum showcases locomotives up close, while Bewdley's handsome station buildings offer a glimpse into the golden age of Great Western Railway architecture. Every stop feels like a small chapter in a much larger story.

Yet what truly sets the SVR apart is its atmosphere. This is a railway that doesn't just preserve history — it invites you to step into it.

Your journey often begins at Kidderminster Town Station, where the King & Castle pub stands proudly beside the SVR platforms. More than just a station pub, it's a carefully crafted homage to a Great Western Railway refreshment room, inspired by the historic design once found at Ross-on-Wye.

Inside, polished wood, railway memorabilia, and the gentle hum of

conversation create a warm, nostalgic setting. The pub is renowned for its excellent cask ale selection, with up to eight hand-pulls showcasing local favourites from breweries such as Hobsons, Bewdley, and Bathams, alongside rotating guest ales. Real ciders are drawn from the cellar, and the bar's reputation among ale enthusiasts is well earned.

Food is served daily, with hearty

classics, cobs, and bar snacks that suit the station setting. On Sundays, the pub's roast lunches draw both locals and travellers, while in winter the crackling fire adds a cosy glow to the room.

Conveniently positioned between the heritage line and the mainline station, the King & Castle is a natural meeting point — a place to gather before boarding a steam train or to unwind after a day exploring the valley.

At the northern end of the line, perched right on the platform at Bridgnorth Station, sits the Railwayman's Arms — a pub that feels as though it has always belonged there. With its period décor, traditional bar, and unbeatable view of steam locomotives arriving and departing just yards away, it's one of the most atmospheric railway pubs in Britain.

The Railwayman's Arms is celebrated for its character and authenticity. It offers a strong lineup of local ales, ciders, and spirits, and its prices and friendly service have earned it a loyal following. For many visitors, this is the pub that captures the true spirit of the SVR: relaxed, unpretentious, and steeped in railway heritage.

Whether you're sipping a pint as a locomotive hisses into the station or enjoying the evening sun on the platform, the pub delivers a uniquely immersive experience. It's no surprise that many travellers consider it the highlight of their day out.

The SVR's combination of steam travel and traditional pubs has inspired a number of railway-themed

pub crawls, with enthusiasts hopping between stations and sampling local ales along the way. The King & Castle and the Railwayman's Arms form the natural bookends of such a journey, but Bewdley, Arley, and Hampton Loade also offer charming stops within walking distance of the line. Travelling between pubs by steam train adds a sense of adventure that no ordinary pub crawl can match. It's a celebration of heritage, hospitality, and the simple pleasure of a day well spent.

The Severn Valley Railway is more than a preserved railway — it's a living, breathing celebration of Britain's rail heritage. Its locomotives,

stations, volunteers, and events create an experience that feels both nostalgic and vibrant. And its two iconic pubs, the King & Castle and the Railwayman's Arms, enrich that experience with warmth, character, and a taste of traditional hospitality.

Whether you're a railway enthusiast, a lover of classic pubs, or simply someone seeking a memorable day out, the SVR offers a journey where history, community, and good ale come together in perfect harmony.

## A Good Day Out - Nottingham City Centre

I never need an excuse to visit Nottingham for a pub crawl; really, at least 2 days are needed to do it justice. Our latest visit concentrated on the city centre.

Arriving at the station on a chilly Friday morning we headed over to the Castle Rock Brewery Tap, The Vat and Fiddle which conveniently opens at 11.30. We were met there by a bank of 13 handpumps with many from Castle Rock and a good selection of guests. Just a short walk along and across the canal brings us to the Navigation in Wilford Street.

Timothy Taylor has a strong showing here but up to 3 guests are usually available.

On to a gem of a pub next, the Olde Trip to Jerusalem. Set into the sandstone wall below the castle this is an iconic pub with beers from Greene King and 3 guests on tap. Food is also on the menu here. The pub is reputed to date from the 12<sup>th</sup> century. Our next pub, the Crow just up the hill from the Trip, is listed as having up to 6 beers. Unfortunately on our visit there were only 2 and uninteresting ones at that. Moving

swiftly on we visited the Bell, another 'heritage' pub dating from the 15<sup>th</sup> century; again owned by Greene King with up to 8 beers with a good smattering of guests and an extensive food menu.

Our next stop was a micropub, The Barrel Drop - not easy to find as it is hidden up an alley, Hurts Yard, between Angel Row and Upper Parliament Street. Up to 5 beers are to be found in this small tucked away pub. Board games of various types seem a popular pastime here. Not far is The Dragon - a current GBG entry, it feels a little tired inside

but has up to 5 beers with Oakham Citra being a constant.

It was time for a bit of a walk now to the Angel Microbrewery in Stoney Street. The building dates back to the 16<sup>th</sup> century with the Angel Brewery opening in 2016. Recently

refurbished, four beers are usually available from their own brewery and from Black Iris with guests on tap as well. Food is available here too. Next on our list was the Kean's Head, another Castle Rock pub. On my recce for this tour I had a good chat with the landlord. He was very enthusiastic, stressing he has guests which are not in the other Castle Rock pubs. So with up to 6 beers and food this is a pub to be sought out on St Mary's Gate.

And so to our last pub, the Brew Tavern micropub at the station at Nottingham. Many will know it as the Cabmen's Shelter from former days when that was its function. With up to

five beers and ciders, it was a fitting end to our day.

A little advice on Nottingham: Many pubs open later in the afternoon Mondays to Thursdays, and some are closed Mondays and Tuesdays. Do check times before you decide on a date. Without doubt Fridays are the best day. Saturdays can be a little hectic in the pubs. All the best!

## Gardeners Arms - A Notorious Murder!

Originally a timber-framed building, the Gardeners Arms opened on Solihull High Street in the 1860s, next to where McDonald's is today. It was owned by the Lines family until after World War I and was noted for its home brewed ales. In a 1907 advertisement the Gardeners Arms is proclaimed as the 'Only Home Brewed House in the district'.



The Gardeners Arms was the location for an infamous murder on 5<sup>th</sup> December 1880 when John Duff shot fellow Irishman, John Gateley, in the stomach. The two men had been drinking at the pub and conversing in Irish Gaelic when Duff called Gateley into the yard; he pulled a pistol and shot Gateley in the stomach. Duff had accused Gateley of being a traitor to the Fenian (Republican) cause. It was reported that Duff was wearing a long coat and billycock (bowler) hat on the day of the murder. Duff initially returned to Birmingham, where he worked, then evaded being

apprehended by becoming a ship's stoker, travelling to the USA and Far East. Duff was eventually apprehended in London almost five years after the murder. His trial took place at Warwick Assizes in November 1885 where Duff was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to 20 years penal servitude. The landlord at the time of the murder was James Bridges

According to the 1891 census James Bridges was still the publican, with George Lines, from Worcester, lodging in the pub. However, by 1896, according to Kellys trade directory, William Lines had become the proprietor, and in the 1901 census he was a brewer. This c.1902 postcard image of the Gardeners Arms, shown by kind permission of the Core Library, Solihull, has been cleaned and colourised using an AI program. The inscription above the windows reads "Lines's Famous Home Brewed Ales, Foreign and British Wines". During the 1960s Nick and Pat Yarnold were the licensees, however, redevelopment pressures mounted and in 1971, after more than a century of service, the pub was demolished.
